


2023/2024 Community Grants Overview

Funding Allocation

A total of **\$242,559** was allocated in 2023/2024.

An increase of 17.65% in funding, compared to the \$206,147.11 allocated in 2022/2023

Applications Received

146 applications were received from **114** unique community groups or individuals.

This marks a 34% increase from 2022/2023, which had 109 applications from 87 groups.

Project Delivery

89 projects have been successfully implemented or are underway in the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board area with Local Board funding support in 2023/2024.

This marks a 34.85% growth compared to the 66 projects in 2022/2023.

Community Group Support

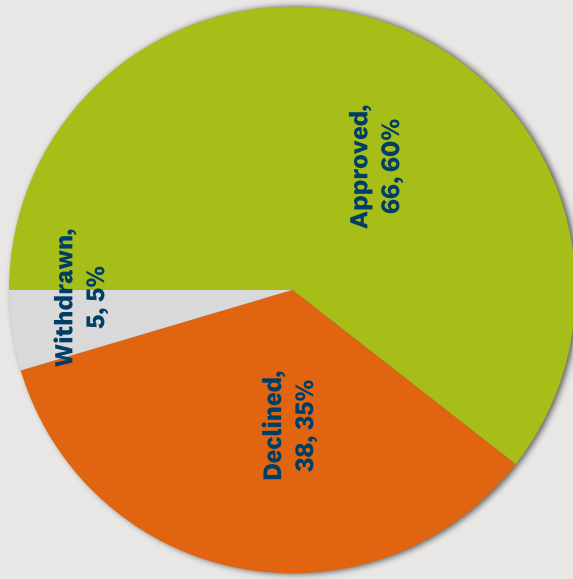
72 community groups/individuals were supported through the Local Board grants rounds in 2023/2024.

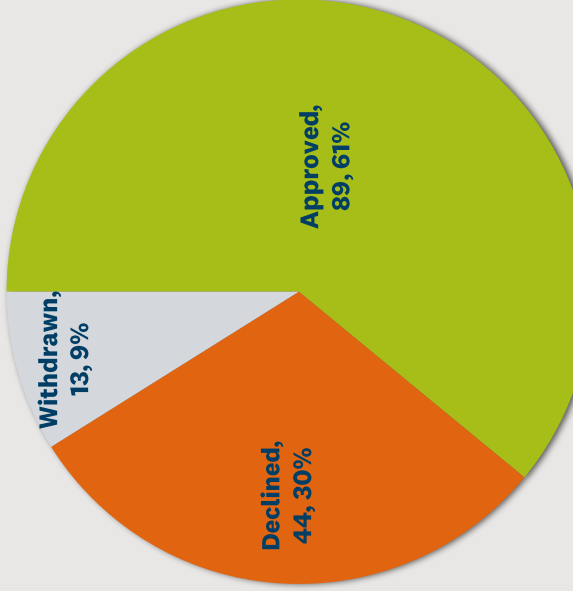

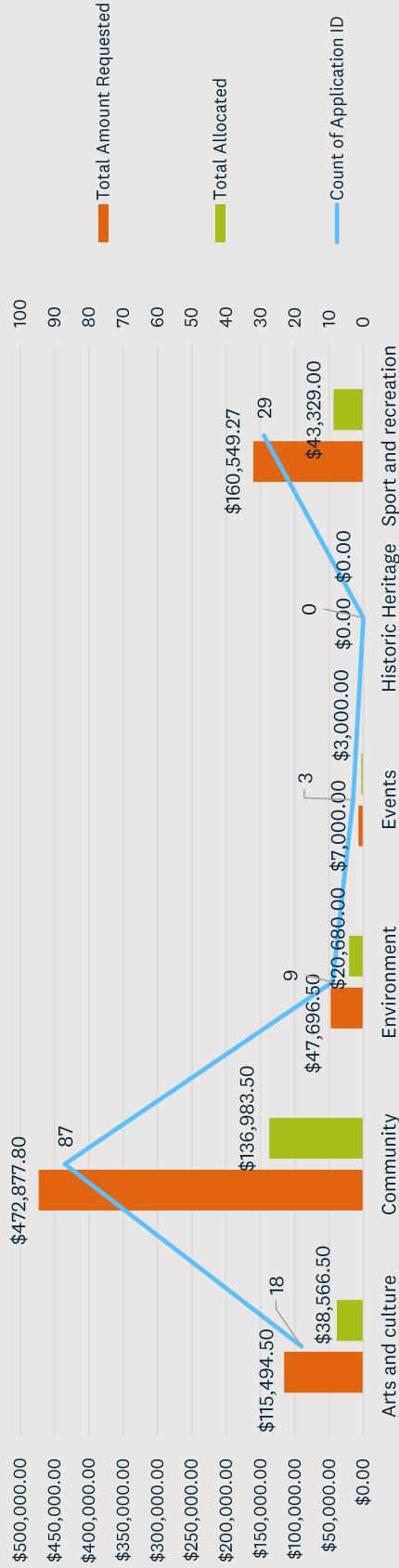

Revitalising Town Centre

In June 2023, the board approved the 2023/2024 Community Grant budget, with **\$80,000** ring-fenced for projects aligned with the **Revitalising Town Centre** criteria.*

The grant aims to support initiatives that **revitalise local town centres and boost economic activity**.

Applications were submitted through the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Grants and Quick Response Rounds and were assessed on a case-by-case basis by Grants Advisor and SMEs.

*The criteria are:

- Revitalising town centres.
- Neighbourhood or community events or activations in the town centre.
- Beautification of town centres.
- Business development workshops that benefit local business owners.
- Mentoring on strategic thinking and planning for business associations.
- Safety initiatives.
- Building kai resilience around town centres.
- Cultural reflection of communities within the local board catchment area.

2023/2024 Ring-fenced amount for targeted service

Environment

In June 2023, the board approved the 2023/2024 Community Grant budget, with **\$40,000** ring-fenced for projects that meet the **Environment** outcomes.*

The grant aims to support and **grow community and landowner conservation efforts and environmental initiatives** within the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board area.

Applications were submitted through the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Grants and Quick Response Rounds and were assessed on a case-by-case basis by Grants Advisor and SMEs.

*The outcomes are:

- Forest, coastlines, islands, wetlands and marine areas are flourishing and protected.
- Our community is engaged with their natural environment and is actively involved in the care, protection and restoration of their environment.
- Community projects follow good practice and achieve long term benefits.
- Contributes towards resolving global environmental issues, including low carbon initiatives

2023/2024 Ring-fenced amount for targeted service



8 applications met the **Revitalising Town Centre** criteria, requesting a total of \$37,385.

All **8** applications were approved (100%), with the board allocating **\$22,260 (59%)**.



9 applications met the **Environment outcomes**, requesting a total of **\$47,696.50**.

5 of these applications were approved (55%), with the board allocating **\$20,680 (43%)**.



The remaining ring-fenced budget was then uplifted to support other community grant applications.

The programme was developed within a limited timeline, which meant there was less time for comprehensive programme design and promotion.

However, with valuable support from subject matter experts and targeted promotion, the programme still attracted a solid level of interest and some strong applications.

The ring-fenced amount allocated to specific projects was substantial, which placed some constraints on the overall budget for the Community Grant programme, the experience provided valuable insights.

Outcomes outlined in the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board Plan 2023

Our people

- Our people are our strength. Engaging with our diverse communities – from Māori, Pacific peoples, and children to rangatahi (youth) and senior people – enables us to provide the services and facilities they need, leading to better wellbeing

Our environment

- Toitū te whenua, whatungarongaro te tangata. Our land is permanent, while people come and go. Your resilience was tested with destructive weather events in early 2023 and it held. We can help strengthen your ability to preserve our natural environment and sites of significance so that future generations can enjoy them.

Our community

- We are home to the largest population of Pacific people in Auckland. We also have a high proportion of Māori residents and growing ethnic diversity. That diversity means we need dynamic spaces and facilities.
- Our venues, local parks and open spaces must provide for the everchanging experiences of our residents now and in the future. We will do this by partnering with mana whenua and our wider community.

Our places

- We want great, safe neighbourhoods that are well connected with accessible local transport options. We want to create and design attractive spaces that meet your needs and greatly enhance the quality of life for residents.

Our economy

- We want to attract and retain businesses in our town centres and industrial areas. We want to support our big developers, such as Auckland International Airport, and our various business associations to make it easier for employers and employees to benefit from being in Māngere-Ōtāhuhu.

Higher priorities

Higher Priorities will be given to the applications that

- align with “Revitalising Town Centre” priorities*
- align with “Environment” priorities*
- provide opportunities for youth leadership and participation in employment
- increase and enhance digital skills, access, and abilities for all
- celebrate culture diversity
- promote uptake of walking, cycling and public transport that increase community connectivity, improve health and reduce emissions
- tackle illegal dumping in hot spot areas
- address anti-social behaviour and address local safety issues, supporting neighbourhood safety and crime prevention
- carry out stream restoration, pest control, tree planting that cope with the impacts of climate change
- share local climate action information and education opportunities
- are waste minimisation projects and help revitalise and increase economic activity in the local town centres
- that are delivered around our town centres to support the local economy and encourage community inclusion

Revitalising Town Centres Priorities

Higher priority will be given to initiatives that are:

- Promoting **economic development** in the town centres and strengthening their roles as **community hubs**.
- Building **capacity and empowerment** in the community.
- Neighbourhood or community **events or activations in the town centre**.
- **Beautification** of town centres.
- **Free or low cost business development workshops** that benefit local business owners.
- **Mentoring** on strategic thinking and **planning** for business associations.
- Building **kai resilience** around town centres.

Environment Priorities

Higher priority will be given to initiatives that are:

- **Education and awareness programmes** to manage waste safely and reduce the negative impact on the environment
- **Waste minimisation, food scraps, community gardens** programmes
- **Managing pest** plants and pest animals to protect **biodiversity** values
- **Local stream** restoration and improving the quality of local **waterways**
- **Material costs** associated with environmental projects (e.g. plants, fencing material, and equipment)
- **Tree planting** initiatives
- ~~Collaborating with other community organisations~~



Lower priorities and Eligibility Exclusions

Suggested changes in Green

Lower priorities will be given to applications that

- are ticketed events
- operational costs, including wages and salaries except where professional services are required beyond the expertise of the applicant, i.e., specialists, facilitator, coaching fees.
- support the purchase of, or maintenance associated with, motor vehicles
- benefit a third party (e.g. activity to gain money for an organisation)
- for activities, or from groups outside the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board area
- for the same project that has been funded by local board in the same financial year
- no quotes and/or detailed project plan provided
- ~~request to cover for wages or operational costs:~~
- ~~applicant who have failed to complete or provide a satisfactory form from previous grants received~~ >> moved to ineligibility section

What we won't fund

As per the [Community Grants Policy 2014](#) 'scope and eligibility' for general eligibility

- Ineligible applicants – Paragraph 78
- What we won't fund – Paragraphs 84-86
- Lower priority – Paragraphs 87-88

In addition to the eligibility criteria outlined in the Community Grants Policy, the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board will not fund:

- Applicants who have failed to complete or provide a **satisfactory accountability form** from previous grants received
- Applications for projects or events with **start dates** earlier than the round required project start date

Changing the Grant Round Structure for 2025/2026

Current Structure	2 Local Grant rounds + 2 Quick Response rounds
Observation	Different funding brackets and deadlines may cause applicants to apply for the wrong round and miss funding opportunities. Multiple criteria and information can make the process challenging for first-time applicants and smaller groups.
Proposed Change	Transition to 3* Local Grant rounds with a minimum funding request of \$500* *3 rounds for 2025/2026 considering no decision to be made in October and November 2025 (election) *No applicant applied for under \$500 in the recent three years.

Reduced Confusion

- A unified grant round with consistent criteria makes the application process easier to follow and reduces confusion.

Greater Flexibility

- With three rounds per year, applicants have more opportunities to apply, making it easier to align with project timelines.

Improved Coverage

- A consistent structure allows for broader support and better distribution of funds throughout the year.

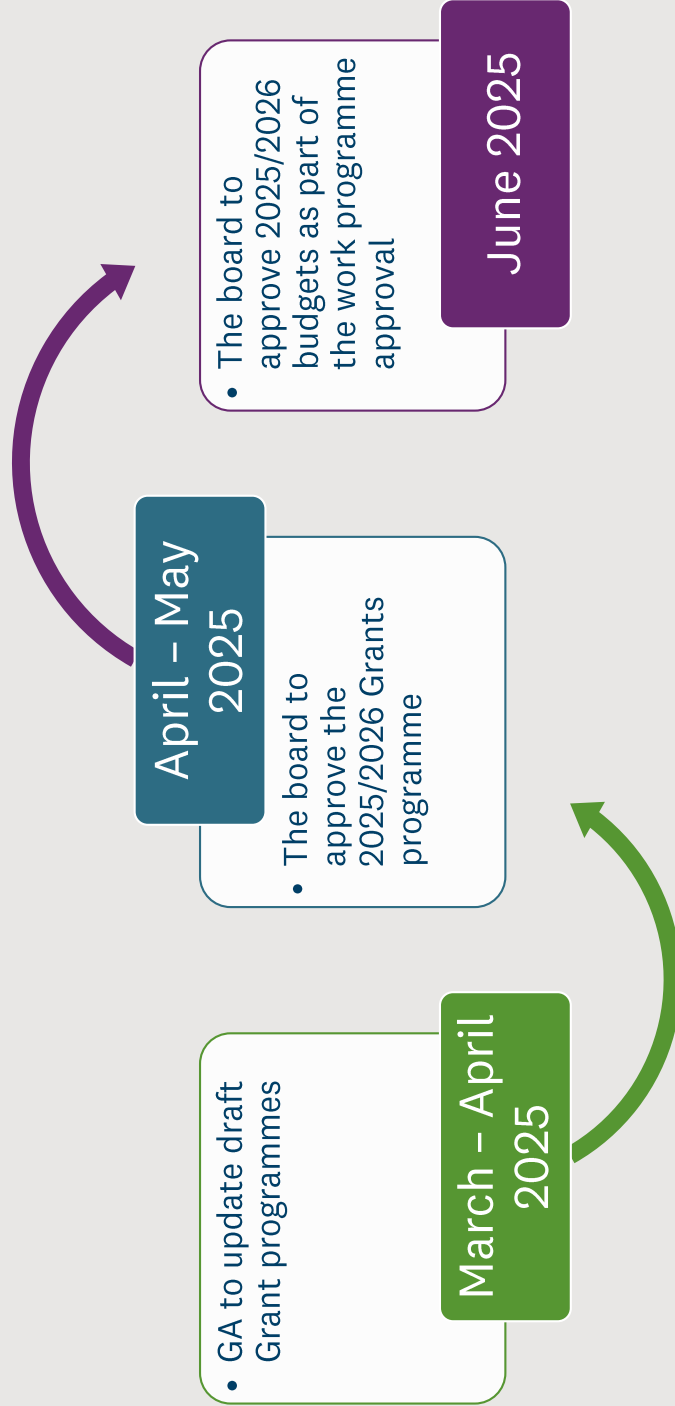
