1. Purpose

This memo provides an update on the Airport to Botany Bus Rapid Transit project (A2B) as part of Te Tupu Ngātahi (Supporting Growth) programme.

NZTA and AT established Te Tupu Ngātahi in 2018 to identify and protect the future transport network because Auckland’s population is expected to increase by one million by 2050.

Seventy Notices of Requirement (NoR) were lodged to protect corridors of land for future transport use in the North West, North and South of Auckland, by way of designation.

Placing a designation over land to protect it does not guarantee funding for construction or expedite implementation. However, it has multiple benefits, including:

- Providing certainty about where transport routes will go.
- Helping to make informed decisions about future planning.
- Allowing flexibility to respond/construct as development occurs.
- Ensuring land will be ready when it’s required; and
- Significant cost savings rather than ad-hoc land acquisition at the time of delivery.





2. Airport to Botany Bus Rapid Transit project

Current Status

A total of 13 appeals were received. Currently there are eight unresolved. Four appeals have been resolved, and one was withdrawn.

A number of strategies are in place to manage the appeals including court-assisted mediation and formal settlement proposals as a result of direct discussions. The project team are due to report to the Court late mid-March 2025.

One appeal is scheduled for mediation at the end of February 2025, with the remaining appeals underway via direct discussion. The Project team is confident that the remaining appeals will be resolved without the need for court-assisted mediation.

Purpose

1. To inform elected members about Resilient Tāmaki Makaurau – community planning for climate disruption and pilots beginning in local communities.

Summary

2. The Resilient Tāmaki Makaurau work programme was developed following the flooding and cyclone of January and February 2023.
3. Developing the most effective approaches to supporting Auckland's communities to plan for climate disruption will reduce the impacts of future events to council and our communities, including costs of remediation, clean-up and property buy-outs.
4. This memorandum focuses on one element of the programme - community planning which is fully funded through department budgets and the Storm Response Fund.
5. As part of the programme staff are beginning to pilot methods and ways of working in local communities. The first pilot is in the Papakura Local Board area, but other areas will be in future pilots.
6. The key challenge for the programme is the lack of a government framework, particularly the lack of detail around what role central government will take, what funding will be provided, how and what for. Staff expect the government to announce legislation on this in early 2025 but it is not yet clear to what extent the legislation will resolve these issues.

Context

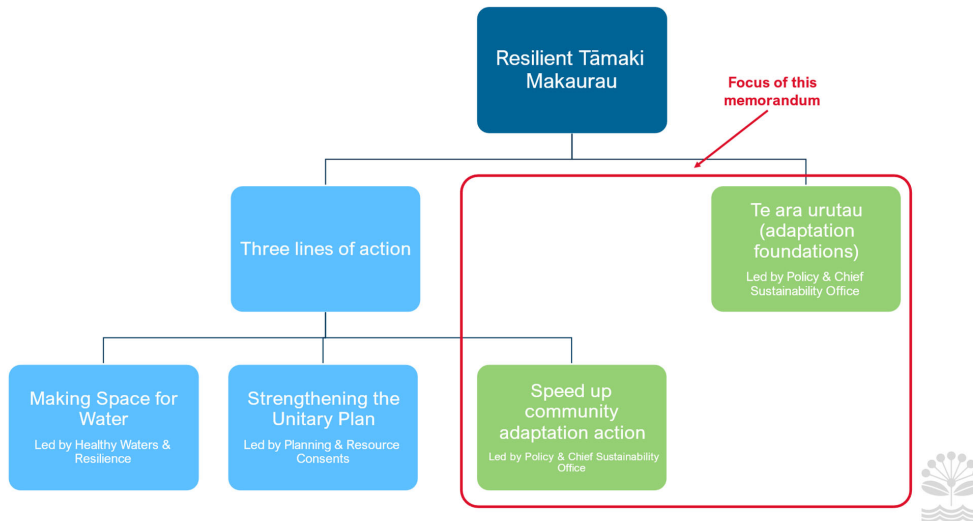
The Resilient Tāmaki Makaurau work programme was endorsed following severe weather in 2023

7. A scope of works to investigate the impacts and implications of the extreme weather events and the required improvements for policy and infrastructure settings was approved by a delegated committee and noted at the Planning, Environment and Parks committee in March 2023 ([PEPCC/2023/25](#)).
8. On 29 June 2023, the Planning, Environment and Parks committee (PEPCC/2023/81):
 - endorsed the Accelerating a Resilient Tāmaki Makaurau insight report
 - noted that for the three lines of action within 'Accelerating a Resilient Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland':
 - i. Strengthening the Unitary Plan is reported separately
 - ii. Speeding up community adaptation is funded

Page 1

- iii. Making Space for Water was going for public consultation and would be reported separately.
- 2. The Resilient Tāmaki Makaurau work programme structure is in Figure 1 below.

Figure 1. Resilient Tāmaki Makaurau Programme Structure



- 9. As in Figure 1, this memorandum relates to the council's levers in **community planning for climate disruption** (Speed up community adaptation line of action and Te ara Urutau / the longer-term journey). Staff are ensuring a coordinated approach with the other lines of action, but they are reported separately.
- 10. The programme is fully funded through department budgets and the Storm Response Fund.
- 11. There are other work programmes across council that align with this work. Staff are working collaboratively to ensure a coordinated approach (for instance, see CP2024/13162 for a recent update on the Recovery Office's work, which also includes an update on the Making Space for Water programme).

Planning for climate disruption requires working together and long-term thinking

- 12. Climate disruption will require communities and council to work together to identify solutions, fund and implement interventions across Auckland.
- 13. When the council, mana whenua, mataawaka and communities prepare earlier, we are likely to have more options, more time to implement them, with a smoother transition and lower costs. By working together, communities will be better placed to create lasting solutions.
- 14. Investing in community-led planning will help to identify impactful solutions that meet all community's needs. This will inform wise prioritisation of future council investment.

Central government is developing a national framework

- 15. Central government is currently developing a National Adaptation Framework. This framework will set out the government's approach to sharing the costs of adapting to climate change. Legislation to support this framework is expected to be introduced in 2025.
- 16. The National Adaptation Framework is a critical input, as it is expected to clarify the roles of local government, insurers, and other groups in supporting and funding adaptation activity.



Work is underway or complete for all speeding up community adaptation actions

17. We are delivering a range of mahi that will help us and the community be climate ready. These are summarised in Figure 2.

Discussion

Pilot programme beginning in Papakura with other local board areas in future

18. From our work to date we know communities want to know more about climate disruption and how plan. They have also told us that they want to know council is being responsible in the ways we can help communities be climate ready.
19. Under Speed up community line of action staff are initiating a pilot planning project in the Papakura Local Board area. Over time staff will be working in other local board areas as well as testing region-wide approaches.
20. The Papakura community pilot will test the most effective methods of empowering local communities to engage in grass roots climate adaptation by:
 - o directly investing in community-led adaptation planning, action & participation
 - o testing participatory ways of working and investing in community-led activities
 - o simplifying community access to council knowledge and resources
 - o funding grants through the Recovery Office for communities most impacted by the 2023 weather events to support development and implementation of local recovery plans.

The council's future approach will also be informed by central government legislation

21. The key challenge for the programme is the lack of a government framework, particularly the lack of detail around what role central government will take and what funding will be provided, how and what for. We expect the government to announce legislation on this in early 2025 but it is not yet clear to what extent the legislation will resolve these issues.

Next steps

22. Staff will engage directly with the Papakura Local Board on the pilot in their area. This will be used to inform work in other areas with local boards engaged on work in their areas.
23. Councillors will continue to be briefed on this work at key milestones and where decisions are required.

Purpose

1. To inform the committee about recent decisions made by independent hearing commissioners on council-initiated plan changes to the Auckland Unitary Plan (AUP) and private plan change requests.
2. To inform the committee about private plan change requests that have been accepted by staff (enabling notification for submissions), and any submissions made by the council on private plan change requests.

Summary

3. Since making the AUP 'operative in part' in November 2016, the council has initiated **38** plan changes to the AUP and received **70** private plan change requests. **108** plan changes were notified during that same period.
4. Between **31 January** and **28 February 2028**, **one** plan change decision was notified. During that same period, **no** private plan change requests were accepted by staff and **no** submissions were made by the council on private plan change requests.

Overview

5. Since making the AUP 'operative in part' in November 2016, the council has initiated 38 plan changes. 31 of these plan changes are now operative, two were subsequently withdrawn and five are still working their way through the Schedule 1 process under the Resource Management Act (RMA).
6. Since making the AUP 'operative in part', the council has also received 70 private plan change requests. 50 of these private plan changes are operative and 16 are still working their way through the Schedule 1 process under the RMA. Two of the private plan changes were withdrawn and two were declined.

Recent plan change decisions

8. The table below sets out recent the decisions made by independent hearing commissioners on plan changes to the AUP where the decisions were notified between 31 January and 28 February 2025.

Recent private plan change requests

10. Under the RMA, any person or organisation can request a change to the regional plan (but not the Regional Policy Statement) and district plan provisions of the AUP. These requests are referred to as private plan change requests. They typically relate to situations where a landowner wants to undertake an activity or development for which it would be difficult to obtain a resource consent under the operative AUP.
11. The relevant provisions for the council's initial consideration of private plan change requests are set out in clause 25 of Schedule 1 to the RMA. Under clause 25, once all relevant information has been received from the private plan change requester, the council must make a decision to:
- accept the request,
 - adopt the request,
 - reject the request, or
 - deal with the request as though it is an application for resource consent.
12. Delegations to the Chief Executive allow the General Manager Planning and Resource Consents and Tier 4 Managers within the Planning and Resource Consents department to make decisions under clause 25 of the RMA. These delegations are not exercised in situations where a private plan change request is potentially contrary to, or inconsistent with the Regional Policy Statement chapter of the AUP, or other council strategic plans such as the Auckland Plan or Future Development Strategy. Private plan changes that fall into this category are reported to the committee for a decision.
13. No private plan changes were accepted by council staff between 31 January and 28 February 2025 and no submissions were made by the council on private plan change requests.

Next steps

14. Unless there are no decisions to report, the next plan change update will be provided prior to the Policy and Planning Committee meeting in April 2025.

1. Purpose

This memorandum provides an update on appeals received on the Auckland Transport (AT) and New Zealand Transport Agency Waka Kotahi (NZTA) decisions on the Notices of Requirements (NoRs) for the Pukekohe, Paerata and south Drury, Takaanini Level Crossing, South Future Transit Network (South FTN) projects in Auckland.

2. Background

NZTA and AT established Te Tupu Ngātahi in 2018 to identify and protect the future transport network because Auckland’s population is expected to increase by one million by 2050. Seventy NoRs were lodged to protect corridors of land for future transport use in the North West, North and South of Auckland, by way of designation.

Placing a designation over land to protect it does not guarantee funding for construction or expedite implementation. However, it has multiple benefits, including:

- Providing certainty about where transport routes will go;
- Helping to make informed decisions about future planning;
- Allowing flexibility to respond/construct as development occurs;
- Ensuring land will be ready when it’s required; and

3. Pukekohe, Paerata and south Drury

Progress on appeals resolution

AT and NZTA issued their decisions to Auckland Council on the nine NoRs comprising the Pukekohe network in October 2024.

A total of four appeals were received, three on NoR 5 and one on NoR 8. All four appeals are currently unresolved. A number of strategies are in place to manage the appeals, and the team is continuing to work to resolve appeals (as relevant).

4. Takaanini Level Crossings and South FTN project

AT and NZTA issued their decisions to Auckland Council on the two NoRs for Takaanini Level Crossing and four NoRs for the South Frequent Transit Network in January 2025. The appeals period recently closed for these projects on the 21st February 2025.

A total of eight appeals were received on these Projects, three appeals were received for Takaanini Level Crossing and five for South FTN.

Maps used to consider implications of adjusting boundaries and truck routes with contractors. Adjustments may improve representative sample or exclude out-of-scope properties.

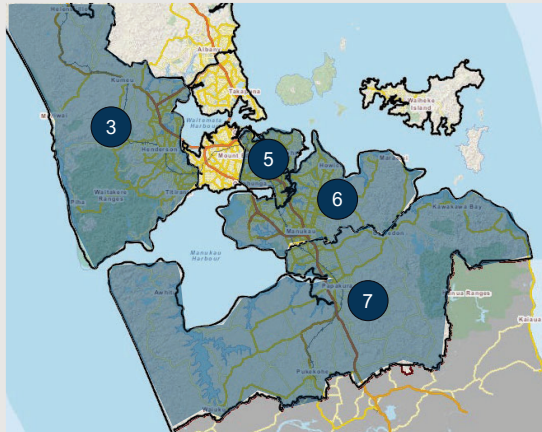

Additional capacity	Providing additional capacity is the primary response to support households with higher waste needs
Eligibility	Additional capacity only provided to households with higher waste needs. Criteria linked to medical waste needs and infants still to be investigated
Cost recovery	Costs of additional capacity passed on to the ratepayer/consumer
Customer billing	Options to support tenants still to be considered
Other options	Continue to provide and explore other options to support households to reduce their waste: strengthened engagement/comms; partnering with others to explore kerbside collections, drop-off, courier returns; investigating recycling capacity
Trial and implementation approach	Recognising further work is still to be done on the trial and implementation approach to providing additional capacity
