This will allow local art makers to improve their skills as well as have a curated exhibition. This funding is to design and print a flyer for the open weekend as well as the coordinator wages to run it (at \$30 per hour).</p> <p>Aligns with purpose: Contribute to a flourishing arts sector that celebrates our unique island identity and is recognised as an arts destination.</p> <p>The expected reach is between 800 to 1,200 people with 100% from Waiheke. Māori outcomes through participation by encouraging tangata whenua to participate but no specific focus.</p> <p>Previous grants accounted for. The last grant funded was for \$3,000 out of a requested \$10,000 in the last grant round. This was towards the art map and also two of these open studios (which lowers priority as it is towards the same project in a financial year).</p> <p>Financials show fairly high current assets and a small deficit from 23 to 24. Grant donations and sponsorship makes up about a third of their income.</p> <p>The applicant is not contributing financially (though have given the total cost as \$4,535) and have not sought other funding, income or a cost to participate has not been given, showing an amount missing!</p> <p>If this isn't funded the project will not go ahead and will need the full \$2,000 to continue.</p> <p>Wages are a low priority.</p> <p>My recommendation would be \$1,000 for this (based on other funding given to this group and that arts and culture grants are usually highly funded) however they have given \$2,000 as the minimum for this to proceed. We do have funds to support this, so either decline if other funds are raised or accept at the \$2,000.</p>	<p>From previous assessment: The Art Map promotes community connectedness by serving as a guide for locals and the community to interact and learn about local art makers.</p> <p>By featuring 35 venues, the Art Map enables diverse participants and inclusion, showcasing a variety of local artists and their work.</p> <p>The project is based on the island, which aligns with the board's priority for local-based projects. The distribution via the gallery and other outlets also promotes Waiheke as a sanctuary in the gulf and a sustainable tourism destination.</p> <p>The collaboration with the Waiheke Weekender for advertising indicates a level of collaboration with other community organisations, which is a higher priority for the board.</p> <p>However, the application does not explicitly mention the use of local suppliers for the production, nor does it touch upon other key priorities like sustainability, Te Ao Māori, or environmental initiatives.</p> <p>The Art Map aligns with several of the board's priorities including: - Environmental approach and Māori participation.</p>	\$2,000.00	\$2,000.00	\$0.00	
IR2518-203	Waiheke Playgroup	Waiheke Playgroup Reta street, Old Blackpool School Hall 03/04/2025 - 02/04/2026 Towards venue hire, general cleaning and refreshments for the board. Old Blackpool Hall from 3 April 2025 to 2 April 2026	Community Eligible	<p>The applicant is seeking funding to run the Waiheke Playgroup at Blackpool Hall.</p> <p>Aligns with purpose: Develop community capacity to be resilient and connected.</p> <p>The expected reach is 10 parents + children (unsure of total children amount) per session. They will run this twice a week for 50 weeks of the year. Some Māori outcomes through use of Te Reo.</p> <p>Previous grants accounted for. The applicant received \$4,000 out of a requested \$8,000 in 2024 towards similar costs!</p> <p>Quotes have only been provided for the venue hire (\$1,000 of the total cost). No quotes have been given for the general running costs or flag/chalk board.</p> <p>Financials show the applicant is entirely funded by grants (including MoE funding) and a small proportion of parents paying. There is a small amount of profit gained between years.</p> <p>The applicant is contributing \$2,000, expects \$6,000 in other funding (though noting the total cost given is \$7,010.22).</p> <p>If this isn't funded the project will not continue (likely by shutting down for periods of the year). They have given \$1,800 as the minimum to continue.</p> <p>Priority is lowered as there is a participation cost of \$5 per family per session (100 sessions per year, \$5,000 expected income).</p> <p>Recommend funding in line with SME comments - noting they have said \$1,800 is the minimum to continue which is below SME recommendation but have continued with low funding previously. This does have a low reach but is for a longer time period.</p>	<p>Waiheke Playgroup is run by parent volunteers and provides a welcoming and affordable option for families with preschool children to connect and learn through play. I support funding towards venue hire, and for the flag and chalkboard to help welcome new families and promote the playgroup.</p>	\$2,000.00	\$1,200.00	\$0.00	

JR2515-204	Waiheke Island Historical Society Inc	Solar panels at the Museum of Waiheke Day Cottage, 165 Oretangi Road, Waiheke Island 01/04/2025 - 30/04/2025 Towards solar panels and equipment at the Museum of Waiheke	Arts and culture Eligible	<p>The applicant is seeking funding to install solar panels and the ancillary equipment on the Museum of Waiheke.</p> <p>Aligns with purpose: Improve our community's wellbeing by providing quality arts, recreational and community events in open spaces and our community facilities - they are stating this is to help with the rising cost of utilities.</p> <p>The applicant has not given an expected reach. No Māori outcomes identified.</p> <p>Previous grants accounted for: The last grant funded was in 2021 for \$332 towards republishing of the book Waiheke Pioneers.</p> <p>The total cost of this is \$9,191.68 and the applicant has said they can contribute \$4,801.68 and have said \$2,000 in donated solar panels (not yet confirmed). They have said they aren't sure if they can continue with partial funding stating they are unsure how long it will take for this to recoup costs, so are unsure how much they are willing to invest. They have given \$1,200 as the minimum to proceed.</p> <p>Financials show quite a high surplus and current assets that could cover these costs with difficulty.</p> <p>Noting that the applicant has confirmed with the land owner approval team that they can do this work (the land is owned by the council while the building is owned by the group).</p> <p>Recommend funding in line with SME comments.</p>	\$2,000.00	\$2,000.00	\$0.00	<p>Solar panels will help the Waiheke Museum to become more sustainable, environmentally and economically. The project aligns with the Waiheke Climate Action Plan. The museum has the option of adding battery storage at a later date. Waiheke Island Historical Society has seldom requested local board funding. I support fully funding their request for a contribution towards the costs of the panels and installation.</p>
JR2515-206	Waiheke Tennis Club	Junior Tennis coaching for families that can't afford Oretangi sports park 28/04/2025 - 27/06/2025 Towards coaching wages at Oretangi Sports Park from 28 April 2025 to 27 June 2025	Sport and recreation Eligible	<p>The applicant is seeking funding to restart coaching for junior lessons at the Tennis club. It was previously ran by volunteers at \$5 per lesson and is now seeking to have professionals which will increase the cost of lessons to \$25 to \$30. They are aiming for a grant to reduce this cost to support families who can't afford this.</p> <p>Aligns with purpose: Ensure that youth are valued and have opportunities to thrive.</p> <p>The expected reach is 50 people from Waiheke for 11 weeks. No Māori outcomes identified. There doesn't seem to be a plan in place to identify who needs this funding outside of requests and group knowledge.</p> <p>This is the first time this group has applied.</p> <p>Noting that the pricing does not add up for 11 weeks at \$30 per lesson and the applicant has been contacted.</p> <p>Financials show fairly high current assets for this costs, mainly through continuing low levels of surplus. The applicant is contributing \$1,000 though they have not given a correct total price. They have not sought other funding.</p> <p>If this isn't funded the project would continue by seeking other funding.</p> <p>Priority is raised for projects which address socioeconomic inequality and provides opportunity for those unable to participate without funding support. Priority is lowered as there is a club membership fee of \$30 and for wages ongoing costs.</p> <p>When contacted about how the numbers for this didn't line up, the applicant said they didn't have confirmed people for this and planned to keep the funding as a pot to be used as needed - not something we would typically want from grants. Recommending either declining and having them resapply with more information.</p>	\$2,000.00	\$500.00	\$0.00	

<p>IR2518-208</p> <p>Reach Out Waiheke</p>	<p>Grab a Game Surdale Community Hall 07/04/2025 - 25/11/2025 Towards board games and catering at Surdale Community Hall from 1 April 2025 to 25 November 2025</p>	<p>Community Eligible</p>	<p>The applicant is seeking board games and catering to run weekly sessions of their mental wellbeing project focusing on males. Aligns with purpose. Develop community capacity to be resilient and connected. The expected reach is 25-45 people from Waiheke over a year. No Māori outcomes identified. Previous grants accounted for. The last grant funded was for \$2,000 in August of 2024 for the facilitator fees for this project. Māori grants have been provided for the four weeks of catering (\$100 of the total cost). Financials show high current assets and a surplus over 2324 that could cover this, lowering priority. The applicant is contributing \$2,000 (likely the facilitation costs, but not specified) and has not sought other funding (noting that the entirety of their income is through grants/donations and fundraising). If this isn't funded the project will continue by seeking other fundraising. This is a low cost venture and even without catering costs likely low risk. Recommend funding in line with SME comments.</p>	<p>\$750.00</p>	<p>\$0.00</p>	<p>Reach Out Waiheke has identified a specific need to create a space for men to connect over board games and activities. As an organisation, Reach Out is very responsive and adaptable to emerging needs. They are applying for equipment to start the group. The grant board games could potentially benefit to other community groups and events in future. Men's groups can help with mental health and building resilience through developing supportive relationships. The grant supports the local board plan objective "A healthy and supportive society, where people feel there is care, respect and all people are valued".</p>
<p>IR2518-209</p> <p>The Artworks Theatre Incorporated</p>	<p>Replace the Beanbags! Artworks Courtyard 14/04/2025 - 21/04/2025 Towards bean bags at Artworks Theatre courtyard</p>	<p>Community Eligible</p>	<p>The applicant is seeking funding to purchase beanbags to increase the use of the courtyard as their existing beanbags are old and leaking. Aligns with purpose. Improve our community's wellbeing by providing quality arts, recreational and community events in open spaces and our community facilities. The expected reach is 600 people from Waiheke over the length of a year. Māori outcomes through participation. Previous grants accounted for. The last grant funded was for Kāroa Kids for \$500 in June 2023. They also receive funding through non-contestable grants and worklines. This will purchase nine beanbag covers (\$85 each) and 24 packs of refills (\$19.50 each). Financials show high current assets, lowering priority. The applicant is not contributing financially and has not sought other funding. Without funding this project would not go ahead. With partial funding less beanbags would be replaced, down to \$300 as the minimum to proceed. Recommend full funding in line with SME comments to help activate this space and likely last for a long time.</p>	<p>\$1,315.00</p>	<p>\$0.00</p>	<p>The Artworks courtyard beanbags were funded by the local board in 2018 and have been extremely well used during every event in the courtyard, plus many events throughout the community. They are now worn out and need to be replaced. All Artworks tenants have access to the beanbag storage shed and are able to use these as needed. The beanbags help to make the courtyard a more attractive and inviting space for the community. There are no coats they'll be used even more next Summer once the shade sail is in place.</p>
<p>IR2518-210</p> <p>Living Without Violence (Waiheke Network) Inc</p>	<p>Menopause Support Group Waiheke Resources Trust, Waiheke Sustainability Centre, Meko Street 04/03/2025 - 08/04/2025 Towards guest speaker hire costs at Waiheke Resources Trust</p>	<p>Community Eligible</p>	<p>The applicant is seeking funding to hire a guest speaker to talk to the Menopause Support Group as part of a six week educational course. The guest speaker seems to be an expert on the subject and will be giving a talk on "re-framing ageing" but little other information on them has been given. Aligns with purpose. Develop community capacity to be resilient and connected. The expected reach is 20-40 people from Waiheke over 12 hours. Māori outcomes through participation and planning this support group with Pritish Haroon. Previous grants accounted for. The last grant funded was in May of 2023 towards venue hire and training costs for a family violence prevention course. Financials show very high current assets and surpluses over 2324, lowering priority. The applicant is contributing \$3,140 and has \$2,000 more in MSD funding through the total cost of this course has not been given. If this isn't funded the project will continue without the specialist speaker. Recommend funding in line with SME comments - this covers a similar amount of people as the male mental health project with board games, though we do have</p>	<p>\$2,000.00</p>	<p>\$0.00</p>	<p>Te Arai Roa Manaaki is looking to bring Nikki Bezzant to the island as part of their new menopause support programme. The weekly programme opened last week with 21 participants. However this event will be open to the wider community and is free of charge. If a larger venue is required, then the session will be held at the library. Nikki is a well-known researcher, and Waiheke might not be able to access her normal speaking events in the city, so this is an excellent opportunity for the community to learn and connect with others going through a similar life stage.</p>

JR2516-211	<p>Waiheke Adult Literacy Inc</p>	<p>Creative Connection Waiheke Adult Learning 28/04/2025 - 05/12/2025 Towards facilitator fees at Waiheke Adult Learning from 28 April 2025 to 5 December 2025</p>	<p>Community Eligible</p> <p>The applicant is seeking funding towards facilitation costs to start two pilot programmes in order to give older people in the community chances for social connection. The programmes are: - A reading club - An art café targeting people with dementia</p> <p>Aligns with purpose: Build a healthy, diverse and supportive society, where people feel there is care, respect and all people are valued.</p> <p>The expected reach is 25 people for 20 weeks. No Māori outcomes identified.</p> <p>Previous grants accounted for. The last grant funded was towards Waivahine in October of 2024 for \$2,000 and one for the orchestra in August 2024 for \$2,000.</p> <p>Financials show 2223, lowering priority. There is a minor deficit for this time period. Current assets are high and could cover these costs.</p> <p>The applicant is contributing \$1,500 and has not sought other funding.</p> <p>If this isn't funded the project will continue by doing one of the programmes only. Waives facilitation over this length of time is a lower priority.</p> <p>This supports a smaller amount of people with a lower priority (waives) item than the board games and menopause speaking, though over a longer period of time. We do have the funds to support this, we have the budget to support this but could support this for less as mentioned in SME comments.</p>	<p>\$2,000.00</p>	<p>\$2,000.00</p>	<p>\$0.00</p>	<p>The proposed pilot programmes have strong alignment with the local board plan objective and also with the Tauarohi Kāwhiri Age Friendly Auckland Action Plan goals for Social Participation and Inclusion. There is good collaboration with Dementia Auckland and the island's social workers to define the need and identify participants. WAL is requesting \$1000 for each of the Art Café starting in June and Reading Club starting in December, so it could be considered for funding in either of these programmes in this funding round.</p>

Ostend Reserve 19/04/2025 - 19/04/2025 Towards cups for Ostend Market</p>	<p>Community Eligible</p> <p>The applicant is seeking funding to purchase branded reusable stainless steel cups to reduce on reusable cups to be given to coffee vendors at the market.</p> <p>Aligns with purpose: Ensure economic development on Waiheke is environmentally, economically and socially sustainable.</p> <p>The expected reach is 800 to 1,000 people weekly with 85% from Waiheke. Some Māori outcomes through identity of coordinator and focus of practices.</p> <p>Noting that the accountability for Ostend Market is difficult, as it has gone through several applicants. Previous grants are accounted for. The last grant funded was towards staff costs for Good To Go in October 2022 for \$2,000. The last two times Good To Go has been applied to has been for operating costs and this seems to be a move towards more tangible purchases.</p> <p>Noting as this is an individual requesting less than \$1,000 financials are not required and have not been provided.</p> <p>The applicant is not contributing financially and has not sought other funding. The project will only continue with full funding.</p> <p>We do have funding available to support this, recommend funding in line with SME comments.</p>	<p>\$964.85</p>	<p>\$964.85</p>	<p>\$0.00</p>	<p>Ostend Market is committed to sustainability and reducing waste. The Good to Go scheme, providing reusable plates and cups, has been in operation for several years and has been very successful. However, there is a need to choose paper coffee cups. These are no longer able to be composted on the island, and go to landfill. The current application for stainless steel cups will help to address this issue, as the cups will be used on site at the market and washed by the Good to Go team to be reused many times. The Good to Go team also sources cups and crockery from the Recovery Shop, however these are breakable hence the decision to use stainless steel cups. Ostend Market is very waste-conscious and also separates food waste to be composted on site using bokashi. They are a positive role model for other event organisers and will provide the cups to other community events. This project has excellent alignment with the Waiheke Climate Action Plan.</p>

This will support 10 lunches each with three course meals. Aligns with purpose: Build a healthy, diverse and supportive society, where people feel there is care, respect and all people are valued. The expected reach is 25 to 40 people from Waiheke. The applicant has said this is open to all, but it may practically end up limited to church members. Unclear Māori outcomes provided. Previous grants accounted for. The last grant funded was in May 2023 for \$2,000 towards facilitation, stationary and catering for a young adult workshop. Quotes have not been provided, vastly lowering priority. The applicant will just use this to buy ingredients over the year for this. This works out to be \$7.50 per person for each of the 10 events, or \$12 assuming the 25 people. Financials show a large surplus for the group in 2024. The group is largely supported by grants. Current assets are very high, lowering priority. The applicant is contributing \$1,000 and has not sought other funding. If this isn't funded the project will go ahead by reducing to events every two months instead. There may be an element of providing food to those in financial need which raises priority. This has a similar reach to the board game/nepouse applications, though potentially limited to the church and lacking quotes for accountability. I would not recommend more than the \$1,000 recommended by SME comments.</p>	<p>\$2,000.00</p>	<p>\$1,000.00</p>	<p>\$0.00</p>	<p>Living Waters has run the community lunch for older residents for a number of years. They are seeking the costs of power for the freezer and food vouchers that will be used to purchase the food. Aligns with purpose: Build a healthy, diverse and supportive society, where people feel there is care, respect and all people are valued. The expected reach is 40-60 people weekly from Waiheke. Māori outcomes mentioned but no strong examples of use in practice. Previous grants accounted for. The last grant funded was \$2,000 towards a similar project in 2021. Quotes have not been provided for the food vouchers, though as these are a static cost it isn't a large issue. They say they will use the flexible nature of this to react to emergencies. Financials show a small deficit for 23/24 but very high current assets. Income is primarily through services delivered. The applicant is contributing \$5,000 they have down \$5,000 total for the voucher cost this year. With the current \$0 they are getting \$1,250 per month for eight months. They have not sought other funding. If this isn't funded the project will continue by seeking other funding. Raised priority from: Projects which address socioeconomic inequality and provides opportunity for those not able to participate without funding support. As this has more information than the Living Water application and more benefits (those in financial need, recommend higher funding here with the option for full funding).</p>	<p>\$2,000.00</p>	<p>\$1,200.00</p>	<p>\$0.00</p>	<p>Waiheke Hope Centre plays a vital role in processing rescued food for distribution to the community. This application is towards electricity costs for the walk-in fridge/freezer and for Woolworths vouchers to provide a koha for the volunteers who assist with this project.
