Identified community outcomes:

Communities benefit when the contributions of disabled people, are recognised where an environment and different abilities are acknowledged and valued. This not only benefits disabled individuals but enriches the community as a whole. PHAB clubs embrace diversity to help create accessible and welcoming spaces in communities, schools, workplaces, etc.

The benefits of building of relationships between disabled individuals, whānau, and the local community is important because community benefits when we work together to meet the needs of the community and support vulnerable society members, these partnerships help strengthen bonds and foster an environment where challenges are faced and overcome collectively. As disabled people gain confidence in using facilities and public spaces, their increased participation boosts the local economy, demonstrating resilience in both individuals and communities.

We ensure that disabled people can engage in all aspects of community life, from education to sports and cultural activities. It provides a sense of belonging and acceptance, helping to break down barriers and increase confidence in public spaces. As communities adopt inclusive practices—especially through culturally sensitive engagement—disabled individuals, are able to access the support they need. This inclusion leads to stronger, more cohesive communities where everyone, regardless of ability, can contribute and thrive.

We support disabled members to live an everyday life in everyday places; whether that's for education, work, social activities and activities of daily living. Only by being present and visible in our local community, having opportunities to do what able bodied people take for granted can disabled people access social and recreational activities and participate freely.

Inclusivity: The focus on supporting disabled members and their families/whānau promotes full participation in the community. By emphasizing the importance of ensuring that disabled individuals can access social, educational, and recreational activities just like those without disabilities, we have a commitment to inclusive practices that prioritise the equal rights and opportunities of all members, regardless of ability.

Diversity: PHAB supports diverse needs and aspirations within the community, by our work with disabled members. It is important to support physical needs, but also their social, emotional, and developmental goals and those of their families (e.g., helping families aspire for their disabled children's independence). The program is particularly designed to address disconnection from cultural heritage among Māori youth through traditional waka ama practices.

While our focus is on Māori and Pacific young people, the program is open to all North Shore youth and encourages family participation, creating opportunities for intergenerational learning and community

connection. The program has demonstrated success in building confidence, creating positive peer relationships, and strengthening cultural identity among young participants.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

Speech and language therapy is the single most important intervention for reducing barriers to inclusion in education, social connection, civic participation, and good health and resilience for these children. An inclusive community understands and values the vast contributions people living with disabilities bring to their schools, workplaces, and the neighbourhoods when properly supported.

Without speech and language therapy, chances of employment later in life are drastically reduced for those who cannot communicate: The unemployment rate for people with Down syndrome is estimated at around 80-95%. Speech and language therapy is a critical and cost-effective way to change this. Early intervention programmes such as ours have a demonstrated financial benefit to communities, with one study suggesting every \$1 spent on early intervention can generate \$5.37 for a community.

The benefits of supporting these children to remain in mainstream education go far beyond the individual learner and their whānau: Research shows that typically developing children who share a classroom with a child with an intellectual disability such as Down syndrome have better literacy and numeracy outcomes and greater emotional intelligence than those who do not. If these kids don't have the communication tools necessary to remain in the classroom, everybody misses out.

An inclusive, diverse community is a healthy community, and children living with Down syndrome have a great deal to contribute. But without proper support to help them tackle significant communication and health challenges, they are denied the ability to be included in education and community life, or lead resilient lives. Research clearly identifies regular speech and language therapy as the single most important factor in supporting positive outcomes for children living with Down syndrome. Without this support, many children with Down syndrome will remain non-verbal throughout their lives, unable to connect socially, participate in mainstream education, or contribute to their community.

This life-changing therapy is not publically funded and the cost of private services is far more than most whānau can afford, especially with the cost of living so high. Our project, A Voice for Devonport-Takapuna's Kids with Down Syndrome, will deliver regular, individualised speech and language therapy to 100% of kids living with Down syndrome in the Local Board area in need of assistance.

Having provided speech and language therapy to Aotearoa's children with Down syndrome for 21 years, UpsideDowns has seen the huge impact it makes in their lives: learning to express their needs, communicate with peers, connect socially, be included in schooling, and lead lives of resilience and belonging. By funding this project, the Devonport-Takapuna Local Board will ensure none of these amazing kids are left behind. Each year, our service benefits approximately 950 clients living all across the North Shore. A grant from the Devonport Takapuna Local Board will improve access to family violence help and support, increase whānau participation, and increase the skills of the people who access that support by educating and equipping them to recover, heal, and create better, more resilient lives. We provide and deliver counselling and psycho-educational programmes that support whānau and to teach tools to create respectful relationships free from family violence. These programmes give parents/adults skills to shape their beliefs and values to accomplish healthy relationships and bonds with their children and each other. These skills, values and beliefs enhance healthy well-being and resilience.

In our mens programmes, perpetrators learn skills to help stop abuse and violence in relationships, hence decreasing family violence and stopping the cycle of re-offending.

In our womens and childrens programmes, women and children learn skills to keep themselves safe from abuse and violence (or deal with anger, abuse or violence issues if present).

In our childrens programmes, children learn skills to keep themselves safe from abuse and violence (or to deal with anger, abuse or violence issues if present).

Our approach to serving our community is fundamentally client-led. This means that our clients are actively involved in shaping their own path away from a life dominated by family violence and abuse. By being responsive and adaptable to the needs of our clients, we uphold our commitment to work alongside them, respecting their individuality, being inclusive towards all, and empowering them to take charge of their outcomes. This method aligns with motivational practices where the clients' goals and perspectives drive the process and shape their learnings, which helps build resilience. Community wellbeing is improved by this resilience. Men, women and children learn to communicate – and to live- in a non-abusive, non-judgmental and respectful way.

Māori comprise 17% of our clientele. We use theories & models that have been developed by Maori therapists, such as Te Whare Tapa Whā. We open our group sessions with karakia. We support takatāpui who have been stigmatised, and whose rights as tāngata whenua have been ignored.

Three of our permanent staff members whakapapa Māori.

All our counsellors and facilitators have had considerable training in te Tiriti, racism, and cross-cultural awareness. We engage in a monthly group cultural supervision practise that guides us in understanding and integrating Māori customs, values, and beliefs into our practice.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - Our offices are based on the ground floor, with a dedicated accessible parking space less than 5m from the front ranch slider door. All our offices are accessible to people living with a disability.

Healthy environment approach:

We know that family violence is impacted by the stresses felt by society as a whole – the increase in demand that we saw during and after the COVID-19 pandemic and 2023's floods are evidence of this. Resource scarcity and stress, displacement and migration, and economic pressure caused by climate change significantly impact people's lives, even more so for those already living with family violence. We see our work in helping people build respectful relationships as contributing towards creating resilient communities that can handle climate stresses without violence.

Within our programmes, we talk about health in holistic and culturally-relevant ways, which includes messages about how our physical health impacts our mental & emotional health. We promote being smoke- and vape-free, exercise & movement, and healthy eating as self-care behaviours that support our wellbeing. We have a weekly fruit box for clients and staff in the

kitchen. We work in ways that reduce our impact on the environment, such as recycling and reducing the amount of food packaging we throw away.

Respect affirms the right of all people to freedom from discrimination on the basis of gender, ethnicity, nationality, culture, religion, sexual identity, age, disability, marital status or political opinion. We support clients from anywhere on the North Shore. We are accessible & inclusive to all. Our clients come from a diverse range of backgrounds. 20% of our clients are children and young people under the age of 18. We are a 'one stop shop' for men, women, and children on the North Shore. Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The Big Buddy Mentoring Programme envisions a community in which every boy experiences a nurturing one-to-one relationship with at least one adult male, which in turn allows each of them to develop into their full adult potential; capable of making informed, responsible decisions as involved members of our community.

Without a father figure a boy will grow up searching for what it means to be a man, some are lucky and find it, others won't and the rest of us will feel the consequences - that is boys growing into angry, sad or just plain bad men, inflicting their dysfunction on the world through crime, violence and suicide. Statistics show that about 80 per cent of men in prison in New Zealand had no functional father when growing up or no relationship with their father. Boys who grow up without a father figure can flounder a bit. They need good men in their lives to reference themselves against.

Every boy needs a father figure - a role model - and our goal is to find them one by recruiting, screening and training male volunteers towards becoming the father figures these boys need. In the process we build a better world.

Alignment with local board priorities:

- We value inclusivity, diversity, and resilience

Boys with a Big Buddy in their lives are more confident, because they feel more secure. They become more resilient and are willing to try new things. Their caregivers regularly report improved behavior, better results at school and say that their boys are just happier.

The boy feels valued and this increases his self-confidence. Having a man who cares just about his

well-being tells him he is worth caring about. Because he feels better about himself, he'll try new things and learn resilience through coping with failure and success. Research shows that boys fall through the cracks more than girls when you look at achievement. And there is a lack of male teachers in schools, not having positive male role models at school, at home and in other settings all contribute to boys not being seen and not being valued. Many boys express deep gratitude for the opportunity to have a Big Buddy, but also some have a harder shell, and it can take time and patience to break through external defenses and get them to open up. Ultimately these are some of the issues of why our male youth suicide rates are so alarmingly high in New Zealand.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The production provides the community with an entertaining, low cost fun, family show to attend, suitable for all ages, in the winter months when the weather isn't as good for outside activities. We have a proportion of 'pay what you wish' tickets to reduce financial barriers and provide NZSL interpretation so we are inclusive to Deaf audience members.

We hire a local accessible venue so audience members who have access needs can be included.

We provide a space in the community where all children are welcome to participate in the Arts, no

matter their circumstances. This project brings together children from different age groups, different schools; mainstream and special education and different cultural groups.

Our youth theatre programme connects local children and whānau with each other, enabling young people to have fun, enjoy being creative, learn new skills and make friends. Whānau also connect with each other.

Life can be very isolating for children and young people with disabilities, as many activities are segregated, either for Disabled or non-disabled children. This reduces their social networks and keeps them in a 'disability bubble'. Being with all children in the community widens their social group and increases their sense of belonging.

- We value inclusivity, diversity, and resilience

Our North Shore performing arts class welcomes, values and celebrates inclusion and diversity. Our unique classes have at least 50% of participants identifying as Disabled, neurodiverse or living with challenges such as Blind/Low Vision or d/Deaf.

We welcome sibling groups where one has a disability, so they can participate and perform together in the same production.

We recognise some participants need extra support, and provide this in classes and performances, so everyone can fully participate, and no one is left behind. We provide NZSL interpretation for Deaf audience members.

Inclusion creates connection between Disabled, Neurodiverse and non-disabled children, increasing friendships, which extend outside of the weekly class, reducing isolation and loneliness. Our classes build confidence and self-esteem, through celebrating personal development and growth and performing. We split roles equally between Disabled and non-disabled cast members, valuing everyone's contribution, building resilience individually and as a group.

We find after joining our class, participants feel encouraged to try new things and join more community activities, as they have an improved sense of confidence, self-worth, and community belonging.

We have Autistic participants who begin our class 'non-speaking' and several years later are playing main roles, singing and acting on stage for their community.

Accessible to people with disabilities Yes - Our programme and productions are designed to be accessible and inclusive to people with disabilities. We have hired an accessible venue with step free access, accessible bathrooms and accessible parking on site. The entire front row of the auditorium is designed for wheelchair users who can sit with non-disabled whānau or support people.
The venue is accessible front and back stage for participants with disabilities. Our relaxed show ensures access for people who identify as Autistic or neurodivergent, there is a breakout area if they need time away from the show.
While not termed as a disability, our NZSL interpreted show means we are accessible to people who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing, who use NZSL to communicate, and to Disabled children who use Makaton.

Healthy environment approach: Promote smoke-free messages, Include waste minimisation (zero waste) messages, Healthy options for food and drink, including water as the first choice, Encouraging active lifestyles including movement or fitness programmes, Encourage the reduction of carbon emissions or increase community resilience to the impacts of climate change*

Participation in this project is targeted at school-age young people who live with Disabilities, neurodiversities, challenges such as d/Deaf or Blind/Low Vision, and their mainstream and neurotypical siblings, and peers in the community. This project is targeted at all cultural ethnicities who live locally; Māori, Pacific Peoples, Pākeha, Asian, African, and we have representatives from all of these groups in this project.
