We developed teaching material especially designed for young people that struggle to learn. After doing how assessment on self-esteem, respect, Roadblocks, our teaching method is creative, flexible, focused on individual needs. Our five teaching Core Values are empathy, forgiveness, respect, wise Choices and team Work.</p> <p>We incorporate the three learning styles: auditory (learning by hearing), visual (learning by seeing), kinaesthetic). Our mentoring builds a relationship of trust, which encourages independence in the student, self-determination and acceptance of responsibility for their own destiny.</p>

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The community benefits would be as follows – Engaged students that stay in school, which lowers the chance of opportune crimes such as shop lifting and boosting cars. whanau are included, supported and involved as we work together to support the youth. We offer families support by connecting them with local community services and people who care. As will reduced family stress which allows parents to focus on work/home instead of having to attend meetings to deal with student behavior. It will also allow the police to focus on more serious crimes, instead of following up on poorly behaved students during school hours.

Alignment with local board priorities:

- Family, whānau and social wellbeing is strengthened

We get referrals from families, local community NGO's and police in the Papakura area, for us to work with their young people, aged between 8yr old –15yrs old, 95% are Maori, the rest are of Pacific ethnicity. The reasons for them being referred is that any they wellbeing is very low they struggle with anxiety, have anger issues. They are inclined to hang out on the streets; get involved in fights often involved in crime and uses drugs. Many of them are not attending schools. They

come from very vulnerable families who are struggling with everyday life; family violence is common in their homes.

The outcomes of our mentoring them is Short term – improved positive self-identity & emotional wellbeing; improved school attendance; increased respect for self & others and authority. Medium term – increased academic performance and positive behavioural choices. The cycle of underachievement is broken and social change is happening as young people set and achieve self-determined goals, changing their mind-set on the potential they have for their future. Long term – the intergenerational poverty cycle is broken. The young person achieves educational goals never before achieved in their family resulting in a change of attitude towards education and the relationship of achieving higher paid employment.

We offer families support by connecting them with local community services and people who care. As a result, family stresses are reduced. Home becomes safer and a more functional overall family wellbeing is improved. Positive changes in the community, Youth crime and destructive behaviour is reduced, enhancing community safety and wellbeing.

The school provides NFT with appropriate information to ensure the young person attends the programme that will meet their need. NFT also collaborates and receives referrals from IOSIS, Family Works and Papakura Marae and have built good relationships with their social workers, Oranga Tamariki, Police and other government agencies. Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

In the past 12 months we have responded to the needs of 3,559 people in the Manukau region, and we can be confident that they were all well supported during their time of need. Some of these incidents included aggravated robbery, family harm, fatal motor vehicle crashes, fire, fraud, home invasion, homicide, rape and sexual attacks, sudden deaths, workplace accidents, and suicides. Being a victim of a crime or traumatic event has a much wider negative social impact on the community than just that of the victim. We estimate that for every victim we support up to ten other people are also affected: whānau, friends, work colleagues and employers.

Our timely, personalised support and intervention helps victims to keep contributing to their community in their paid and voluntary work, keeps whānau together and reduces the ongoing economic and social costs of mental health issues like post-traumatic stress disorder. The whole community benefits when there are local support networks who care and are generous in volunteering their time.

We know crime, family harm, suicide and traumatic events can turn someone’s world upside down. We want people to know they’re not alone and that there are people in the community to help them. Crime and traumatic events can affect anyone and have long-lasting emotional, physical, social and financial impacts. Victims often find whānau and friends don’t know how to support them, and society may blame them rather than accept that bad things can happen to good people. Only 24% of victims in Aotearoa report crimes and many do not achieve resolution through the legal system, which tends to focus more on offenders. Victim Support is here to fill these gaps. Research shows services like ours may help restore victims’ faith in society, rebuild trust and foster community care.

Our support helps victims in many ways including feeling listened to, less stressed, informed, empowered and staying engaged with the justice system.

We continue to develop our service so that it is genuinely victim-centric and we do this by underpinning our services with our Te Tiriti o Waitangi framework, Te Whiringa, so that all areas of our organisation breathe Te Tiriti principles, enabling us to uplift Māori, draw on research, and the lived experiences of our clients.

The rainbow community who has much higher incidents of being victimised, and refugees and migrants are also well supported by our organisation. 22% of people who access our services are Māori which is disproportionate to them being 16% of our population. Pasifika people make up 8% of the people who access our services. We continue to develop our work programmes to implement specific programmes to address the inequities in these statistics.

Summary:	Support for the Waka of Caring (WoC) drop-in centre in Manurewa, which has run successfully since December 2019, providing a safe place for people experiencing homelessness in Manurewa, and helping them and other people in South Auckland meet their basic needs, especially as regards food.		
Expertise:	CGFH's experience in delivering homelessness support services includes a showers programme in the winter of 2018, and several years with Helping Hands Devonport, the precursor to Sunday Blessings, which has been serving community meals for up to 200 people for 5+ years. Debbie Munroe, the manager of the WoC drop-in centre, has been providing support to homeless people in Manurewa for 12 years, with the support of her WoC team. The centre has run successfully for more than 5 years. The group became one of MSD's essential services providers during the COVID lockdowns. Groups looking to set up similar centres have visited the drop-in centre from other parts of NZ and from Australia to see how this model is run.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

Everyone is welcome at the drop-in centre, six days a week, 9am-6pm and there are no forms to fill in and no eligibility criteria. Waka of Caring serve the community of Manurewa by meeting their basic needs, including food, clothing and household goods. People are connected to agencies and/or individuals who can help them. At the drop-in centre, people feel listened to and supported. Visitors and volunteers alike can find friends and learn new skills. It is a place where donors in the Manurewa community can bring goods for reuse. Rescued food is collected and distributed. Groups and programmes that have been run or are planned to be run at the centre include: Alcoholics Anonymous, SafeMan SafeFamily, weaving, sewing, making taonga from granite, art therapy, learner licence classes through On Demand, a men's group, a women's group, a "Golden Oldies" group, and Food and Safety Certificates. Youth at Risk attend the drop-in centre through Oranga Tamariki, offenders do community hours there, and students from the Solomon Group undergoing Level 3 training in Community Care, Mental Health and Disabilities attend the drop-in centre. Whanau experiencing problems can meet relevant agencies at the centre for support.

- Our communities experience food security

Waka of Caring operate a foodbank at the drop-in centre, giving out 250+ food parcels Monday-Saturday. During one week in January 2025, they gave out around 300 food parcels a day. They have hot food available at the centre for people to eat while they are visiting. There is no eligibility criteria for receiving a food parcel and whanau know they can come back when they need another one. Waka of Caring receives rescued kai from Kiwi Harvest twice a week, as well as food donations from similar organisations, and does a twice weekly collection of surplus food from Manurewa Woolworths. WoC are keen to establish a community garden, when they have the suitable premises for that.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - There are already people with disabilities who attend the centre, which is accessible for wheelchairs. One of these attendees was an autistic child who accompanied his mother, who was very grateful when Debbie gave the child a bowl of flour to play with. (The mother had been embarrassed about her child's presence at the centre.) Some attendees are cancer patients that

Healthy environment approach:

WoC are supporting and some are elderly people, several with disabilities. Some people who are attending programmes to help them write their CVs have learning disabilities and it is hoped to help these people into employment. Some of the participants in the learner licence classes could not read, so Debbie took them through the material herself.

Include waste minimisation (zero waste) messages, Healthy options for food and drink, including water as the first choice

The environment for many of these people is sleeping on the street and going hungry. The drop-in centre provides shelter and a place where street people can sit and rest, both physically and mentally. There is a shower at the centre that they can use, and Orange Sky has, in the past, provided its shower and laundry service alongside the centre. Much of the food that is donated is rescued food, thus helping to minimise food wastage and emissions. Healthy options for food and drink include actually having a meal and not going hungry. Food is provided for many whanau in addition to street whanau, who do not have enough to feed themselves: food that can both be eaten at the centre and food that can be taken home to use over a number of days/weeks.

The Healthy Environments Principles that are particularly relevant to the project are:

2: "Kai (food) is nutritious, inclusive, accessible, affordable, celebrated and sustainable,"

3: "Our community champions and leaders continue to promote smokefree, alcohol free & drug free (where appropriate)"

Re Principle 3, the Waka of Caring has supported a number of people to become alcohol or drug free.
