Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

In the past 12 months we have responded to the needs of 4,519 people in the Albert Eden Local Board region, and we can be confident that they were all well supported during their time of need. Some of these incidents included aggravated robbery, family harm, fatal motor vehicle crashes, fire, fraud, home invasion, homicide, rape and sexual attacks, sudden deaths, workplace accidents, and suicides.

Being a victim of a crime or traumatic event has a much wider negative social impact on the community than just that of the victim. We estimate that for every victim we support up to ten other people are also affected: whānau, friends, work colleagues and employers.

Our timely, personalised support and intervention helps victims to keep contributing to their community in their paid and voluntary work, keeps whānau together and reduces the ongoing economic and social costs of mental health issues like post-traumatic stress disorder.

The whole community benefits when there are local support networks who care and are generous in volunteering their time.

Our goal is to provide a service that promotes equity and better outcomes for Māori by being culturally responsive and effective. We are focused on finding innovative ways to ensure that victims' voices are heard. It is vital that both our stakeholders and society understand victims' needs and the importance of supporting them. We continue to develop our service so that it is genuinely victim-centric and we do this by underpinning our services with our Te Tiriti o Waitangi framework, Te Whiringa, so that all areas of our organisation breathe the Te Tiriti principles, enabling us to uplift Māori, draw on research, and the lived experiences of our clients.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - We offer New Zealand Sign Language interpreters or services. We provide information in multiple formats, such as large print, or audio recordings. We deliver our services in different ways such as online, in-person, or by phone to meet individual needs. We train staff to understand disability inclusion, communication techniques, and best practices for working with individuals with diverse needs. Our offices and spaces are wheelchair accessible, with ramps, elevators, and accessible restrooms. We provide information about accessible public transport or parking near your facilities.

The rainbow community who has much higher incidents of being victimised, and refugees and migrants are also well supported by our organisation. 22% of people who access our services are Māori which is disproportionate to them being 16% of our population. Pasifika people make up 8% of the people who access our services. We continue to develop our work programmes to implement specific programmes to address the inequities in these statistics.

Demographics

Māori outcomes:

- *Māori focus - tikanga (practices), mātauranga (knowledge), reo (language)*

GirlGuiding NZ understands the importance of increasing Māori participation in its program, guided by a Bi-Culturalism policy emphasising respect between Māori and Tauīwi cultures through the Treaty of Waitangi. All sections of GirlGuiding have access to the Te Ao Māori badge and accompanying programme, allowing girls to explore Māori language, culture, and history, fostering appreciation. We have also recently introduced a Matariki badge, recognising its importance and significance to Māori culture. Furthermore, our members also participate in Māori Language Week. To deepen understanding, GirlGuiding NZ has hosted Te Tiriti o Waitangi workshops for staff and essential volunteers. The aim is to foster positive Māori involvement in Guiding, with knowledge cascading from leadership to grassroots levels.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - GirlGuiding is open to all girls from all ethnicities and abilities. We welcome those whose sensory, emotional, intellectual, learning, social, physical or medical disabilities and difficulties may limit their activities but not their hopes and achievements. The programme of activities is sufficiently flexible for girls of almost any level of ability to participate. Leaders and girls will provide them with the support and encouragement to do so. At the same time, the needs of the other girls in the unit are considered so that the experience is a positive one for all girls in the unit, including any with disabilities. Recently we have been offering training for volunteers regarding neurodiversity to ensure our leaders are better equipped to deliver a neuro-inclusive programme.

Healthy environment approach:

Promote smoke-free messages, Include waste minimisation (zero waste) messages, Healthy options for food and drink, including water as the first choice, Encouraging active lifestyles including movement or fitness programmes

As a youth organisation that provides services to girls under the age of 17, GirlGuiding New Zealand has a policy on smoking.

The guidelines are as follows:

- GirlGuiding NZ always discourages smoking by its members.
- No smoking is permitted in front of girl members.
- Smoking at Guiding events or on GirlGuiding NZ property must occur only in a designated area.
- No girl member under the legal age may smoke.
- Cigarettes must not be sold at Guiding events. We actively support and promote activities involving special events and occasions like being outdoors, being committed to caring for the environment and having healthy and active lifestyles and skills.

Active recreation is a crucial part of what we do. We aim to keep young girls participating in active recreation and sport, making it friendly and fun and instilling confidence in young women to stay active for life. We understand the needs and gaps in young people's ability to access active recreation opportunities and value the quality of young people's experiences of play, physical education, physical activity and sport. We actively support, promote and impart knowledge on healthy eating, environment conservation, and waste minimisation. Camps and outdoor activities are vital to our girls' journey in Guiding. They offer the perfect environment to learn leadership and teamwork skills and gain confidence and appreciation of the outdoors. While on camp trips, our volunteers teach girls how to minimise waste, not

litter, collect any rubbish that is seen in nature, and care for the environment in general.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

Yes, we are a proudly girl-only and girl-led organisation. In practical terms, this means that GirlGuiding is a friendly, inclusive community open to girls and women of all ages, races, religions and backgrounds. Our programmes start as young as 5, and although traditional programmes run until about age 17, the Aotearoa, Connect, and Explore programmes are open to all ages of girls living in isolated areas or those who cannot attend regular meetings for various reasons.

Financial information

Amount requested: \$8000.00

Requesting grant for: We are seeking funding to purchase vital outdoor equipment to ensure the girls participating in Guiding in the Albert Eden Local Board Area get to learn crucial life and leadership skills via outdoor education opportunities. The costs associated with going on camps (camp ground fees, travel and food) will still be fundraised for locally by the girls themselves. But the cost of outdoor equipment is considerable and beyond the girls/volunteers capacity. Therefore we are seeking this grant for them.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

The income listed above (from the term fees) pays for resources for the girls and national support staff costs (to recruit, vet and train new volunteers, recruit and place new girl members, etc.). There are currently no funds available to purchase much-needed equipment like tents. We rely on grants and community fundraising activities. If a grant is successful, however, we try to allocate some of our limited property budget to top up the shortfall. E.g. if the grant only allows us to purchase 2 cookers and the unit really needs 3, we try to support this with our own funds.

Cost of participation: Girls pay \$120 per term to be GirlGuiding members. This programme fee ensures they get access to Guiding resources.
