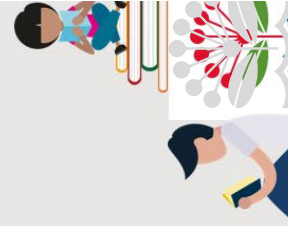
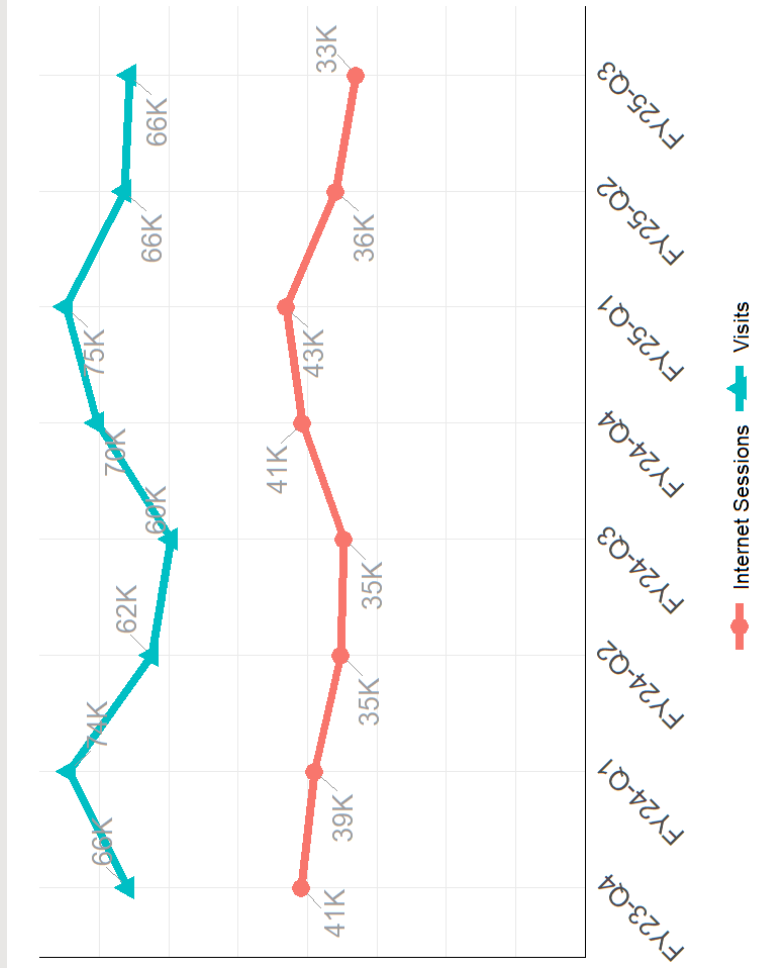

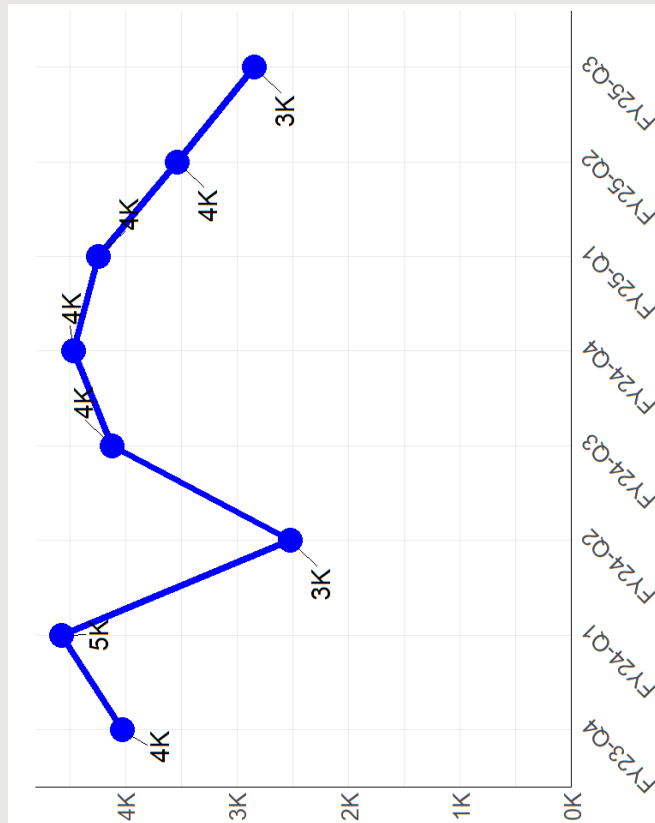
# Performance: Libraries

Number of visits and internet sessions (PC and WiFi)

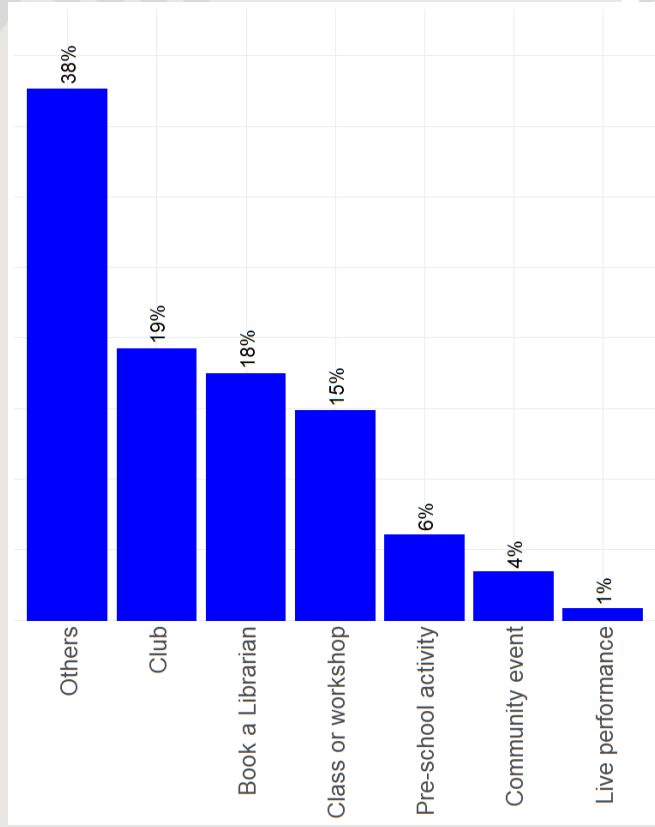


# Performance: Library Activities

Number of participants for programmes and events

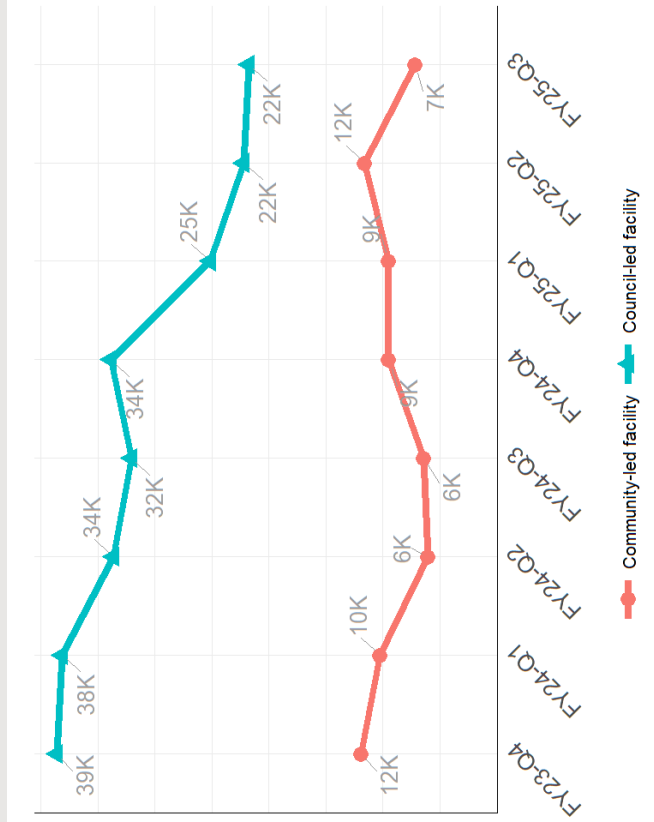


Breakdown of activities delivered in FY25-Q3

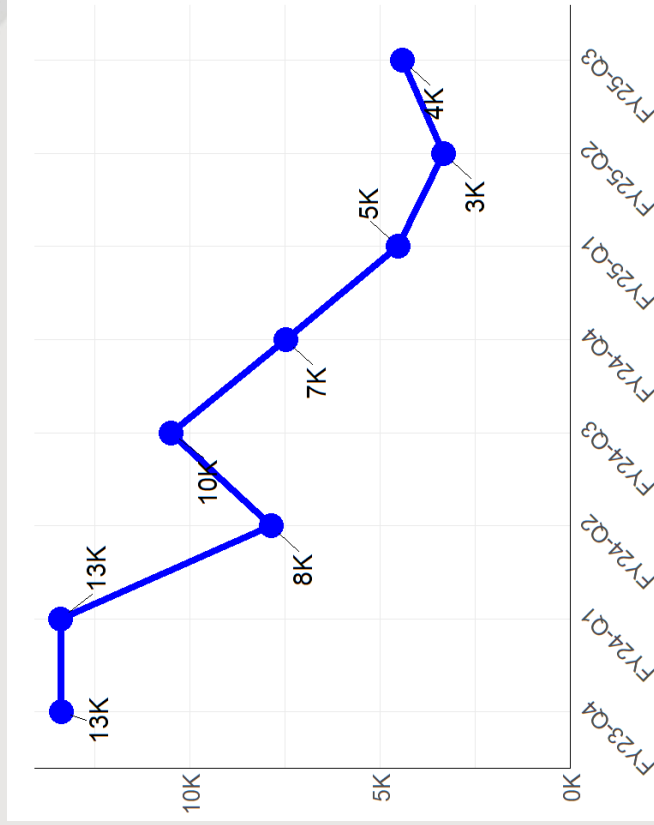

## Local Board community safety initiatives investment Manurewa



- Additional local Ambassador Programme, bringing valuable experience as she prepares for army training.
- CCTV Upgrade for Manurewa and Clendon. Confirmation received for an upgrade to include a master control system - enhances monitoring capabilities and strengthens crime prevention efforts.
- Our "Coffee with a Cop" initiative has been incredibly successful, with demand increasing that there has had to be a cap the event at 100 cups. These sessions have been followed by community walk-arounds with the police, strengthening connections between local officers and residents.
- The Safer Plates initiative has also seen great success, partners such as Plunket Manurewa-Poutolomanawa, Living Smoke Free Service, Counties Manukau Police, Angielatte Café (providing free coffee and treats), and McDonald's have supported, further enhancing the reach and impact of this initiative.

## Locally led food sovereignty



- Te Pua-nga-Maara Charitable Trust, in partnership with the Whenua Warriors, has made significant progress in the Kumara revitalisation initiative - the first major harvest expected at the end of April. This initiative strengthens cultural food practices and enables community involvement.
- Planning has also been underway for Fruit Tree Planting at Glenvaugh Reserve along the stream (between Mahia road and Weymouth road), with site assessments, to enhance community kai accessibility.
