Summary:	<p>We are seeking funding to host a series of garden celebrations that centre cultural sharing and connection through food.</p> <p>We want to host a Halal and Vegetarian Hāngi for Matariki at our māra, giving ethnic community members a chance to experience traditional Māori food in a culturally appropriate way.</p> <p>We also want to spotlight and celebrate healthy food through a spring series of wellbeing gardening sessions that include whakawhānaungatanga, discussions/workshops hosted by our ethnic wāhine farmers, and an opportunity to participate in local kaitiakitanga. This series would serve as a pilot for our aspiration of becoming an ACC provider for wellbeing gardening sessions centred around building connection back to one's self, their environment, and their community after experiencing violence.</p>		
Expertise:	The NZEWT has 24 years of experience of delivering similar kaupapa in Puketāpapa. Our trust continues to grow, expanding our projects and addressing needs as they arise within the community, a clear measure of our success in delivering projects and demonstrating our connection to place and people.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

This kaupapa seeks to insure that marginalised communities are included in local cultural celebrations. Our garden kaupapa is intersectional, using food and kaitiakitanga as vessels for connection and empowerment. We want to showcase our cultural diversity at a hyper local level, and create spaces for conversations about wellness and wellbeing to take place.

Food is a language beyond words, and a way to experience and share culture. The food we eat directly impacts our health and emotional wellbeing. Practicing kaitiakitanga is every human beings right as a child of Papatūānuku, and connects us to personal purpose. This project seeks to draw out greater community empowerment through creating an intersectional event series that enables our most vulnerable to celebrate their value in community by sharing their cultural diversity and individual journey with the wider community.

Alignment with local board priorities:

Puketāpapa

- Communities of greatest need are a focus for support.

With the nature of our project being so intersectional, selecting just one of the grant priorities was difficult. The NZEWT Gardens are a space for sharing culture, skills, growing community resilience, and actively nurturing te taiao. We seek to further the goals of the NZEWT; developing employment opportunities, sharing culture, and supporting the needs of migrant families. The gardens also aim to facilitate a greater public mandate for kaitiakitanga in Puketāpapa.

Our workshops series will provide an opportunity to share food and stories from many cultures, and our partnership with the local schools and Wesley market provides many connection points for migrants and refugee whānau to build their sense of belonging in Puketāpapa.

The Halal and Vegetarian Hāngi Matariki event will support ethnic communities in feeling included and valued in community during Matariki events.

The wellbeing māra sessions will nurture those connections and provide avenues for our ethnic wāhine from challenging backgrounds to be centred, celebrated, and given platform to share their stories and wisdom with the community.

Our belief is that growing and sharing food can be a vessel of transformation and grounding for those who may feel uprooted, be that from trauma, migration, or displacement. We have witnessed how the garden can be a starting point for individuals to find connection within community and want to explore this further.

We are proud of our connection with local Māori led groups who actively support us in designing and delivering elements of all our work that is grounded in mataranga Māori. We will engage with our partners to deliver crucial elements, such as the Hāngī Master, who will manage the fire pit and share stories during the event. Its important that we are supported closely by Māori and local ethnic community members who are able to weave together a culturally appropriate experience. We gratefully rely upon our community connections to deliver these unique cultural events.

The Wellbeing workshop series is grounded in Te Whare Tapa Whā, a holistic approach to wellbeing.

Amount requested: \$8265.36

Requesting grant for: Resourcing our team to plan and deliver the Matariki in the Māra event, and provide ingredients for us to cater to the community. Any cost is a barrier for food insecure whānau, so we are seeking the boards support to make the halal and vege hāngī be koha based. The Matariki event will be a free family fun day style event with activities and games.

The wellbeing series requires some minor infrastructure purchases of a large white board and some folding tables, which will also support our other operations, as well as some budget for marketing and facilitation.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

We would prioritise the Halal Hāngī fun day as we have recieved feedback that ethnic communities want pathways to engage with local culture and Māori culture more in Puketāpapa.

Cost of participation: Koha (Pay as you can) for Hāngī at Matariki event Any koha generated will be used to purchase seeds for spring time planting, a large expense for our community garden.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

In the past 12 months we have responded to the needs of 2,201 people in the Puketapapa Local Boards region, and we can be confident that they were all well supported during their time of need. Some of these incidents included aggravated robbery, family harm, fatal motor vehicle crashes, fire, fraud, home invasion, homicide, rape and sexual attacks, sudden deaths, workplace accidents, and suicides.

Being a victim of a crime or traumatic event has a much wider negative social impact on the community than just that of the victim. We estimate that for every victim we support up to ten other people are also affected: whānau, friends, work colleagues and employers.

Our timely, personalised support and intervention helps victims to keep contributing to their community in their paid and voluntary work, keeps whānau together and reduces the ongoing economic and social costs of mental health issues like post-traumatic stress disorder.

The whole community benefits when there are local support networks who care and are generous in volunteering their time.

Alignment with local board priorities:

Puketāpapa

- People have access to opportunities that improve their wellbeing.

We know crime, family harm, suicide and traumatic events can turn someone's world upside down. We want people to know they're not alone and that there are people in the community to help them. Crime and traumatic events can affect anyone and have long-lasting emotional, physical,

social and financial impacts.

Victims often find whānau and friends don't know how to support them, and society may blame them rather than accept that bad things can happen to good people.

Only 24% of victims in Aotearoa report crimes and many do not achieve resolution through the legal system, which tends to focus more on offenders. Victim Support is here to fill these gaps.

Research shows services like ours may help restore victims' faith in society, rebuild trust and foster community care. Our support helps victims in many ways including feeling listened to, less stressed, informed, empowered and staying engaged with the justice system.

Our goal is to provide a service that promotes equity and better outcomes for Māori by being culturally responsive and effective. We are focused on finding innovative ways to ensure that victims' voices are heard. It is vital that both our stakeholders and society understand victims' needs and the importance of supporting them.

We continue to develop our service so that it is genuinely victim-centric and we do this by underpinning our services with our Te Tiriti o Waitangi framework, Te Whiringa, so that all areas of our organisation breathe Te Tiriti principles, enabling us to uplift Māori, draw on research, and the lived experiences of our clients.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - We offer New Zealand Sign Language interpreters or services. We provide information in multiple formats, such as large print, or audio recordings.

We deliver our services in different ways such as online, in-person, or by phone to meet individual needs.

We train staff to understand disability inclusion, communication techniques, and best practices for working with individuals with diverse needs.

Our offices and spaces are wheelchair accessible, with ramps, elevators, and accessible restrooms. We provide information about accessible public transport or parking near your facilities.

Healthy environment approach:

We continue to develop our work programmes to implement specific programmes to address the inequities in these statistics.

Untame strays are medically assessed and, if well, they are desexed and returned to where they are being fed, with unwell cats being treated before being returned, however some cats need euthanasia due to welfare concerns including if they are unfed. Our project aims mitigate the impact these events are having on the welfare of cats in Auckland		
Expertise:	We are a team of experienced and dedicated animal rescuers, foster carers and volunteers who have worked for many years rescuing stray and abandoned animals in the Auckland area. The founder has vast experience in critical care management for the very sick cats and kittens we have saved over the past few years. We have 42 volunteers: 14 volunteers for the cattery, 1 grants assistant, and 27 foster volunteers (of which 4 are team leaders).

Environmental benefits: Our project benefits the environment and community members who are feeding stray cats at their property, nearby business/industrial areas or at established cat colonies at industrial or rural areas. Issues related to uncontrolled cat breeding -- fighting, spraying, yowling, killing of local wild birdlife -- are minimised.

Cats returned to their cat colony are then fed by volunteers helping protect bird wildlife as the cats are not hungry to kill. Minimising the cat population, but retaining healthy cats through vaccinating is vital -- if the cat population was eradicated, the ecosystem would be overrun with rodent population

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

We help to reduce the stray/unwanted cat population: Kittens and tame cats are brought off the street. Cats who are not re-homed are returned to be fed the community where they were trapped – these cats will reduce in number due to natural attrition over the next few years. This helps to protect the ecosystem of wildlife in urban areas with the reduction of cats free to roam.

On the other hand, if too many stray cats are culled, there would be an explosion and rats and rodents in the community, so it is vital that cats are humanely trapped and desexed and that stray cats be returned to their colonies as they play an important role in keeping rat and rodent numbers at bay.

Cats/kittens that are re-homed to responsible owners limit the numbers who find their way to

abandoned properties or industrial sites and increases protection against the rapid spread of diseases in the cat community and the unnecessary loss of lives.

A further community benefit of our project is the increased mental well-being of owners of the cats who are rehomed and reducing the stress of those concerned for needy cats in the community they come across.

- Our natural environment is valued and cared for, and people feel a sense of connection with local parks, rivers and the harbour.

Our projects helps strengthen whanau and tamaraki well-being by easing stress for those who worry about stray animals. Most properties we attend have concerned residents wanting to do the right thing, unsure how to and also unable to afford the expense. We educate those we support to manage stray cats, seeking to have them be a part of the rescue and trapping process and encouraging them to empower their extended whanau and communities to do the same.

Our work also improves the environment of private residences and public areas as stray cat numbers decrease. Cats/kittens that are re-homed to responsible owners limit the numbers who find their way to abandoned properties or industrial sites and increases protection against the rapid spread of diseases in the cat community and the unnecessary loss of lives. We are planning to work with Kainga Ora with any cats on properties that have been abandoned where tenants have moved and left cats behind.

Further, the natural environment is valued and cared for by our volunteers organising ongoing feeding for the cats who are returned to their colonies—these cats will reduce in number due to natural attrition over the next few years, resulting in a reduction in the stray/unwanted cat population from growing more out of control than it already is.

This in turn helps to protect the ecosystem of wildlife in urban areas with the reduction of cats free to roam. On the other hand, if too many stray cats are culled, there would be an explosion and rats and rodents in the community, so it is vital that cats are humanely trapped and desexed and that stray cats be returned to their colonies as they play an important role in keeping rat and rodent numbers at bay.

The programme serves rangatahi who may otherwise be placed in care homes with underpaid and under-experienced carers, ensuring they have access to professional, nurturing, and consistent support. Through drop-in movement groups designed for individuals 15 years and older with intellectual and/or physical disabilities, Dance 4 Us enhances their overall well-being by offering an engaging, high-energy activity that also encourages a sense of community connection.

Communication can often be a source of frustration and sadness for people with disabilities, especially when they are misunderstood or unable to express themselves verbally. Through dance therapy, we create a safe, culturally responsive environment where all forms of communication are embraced, including non-verbal expression. Here, individuals are given the freedom to fully express themselves, allowing them to overcome the barriers that traditional communication might impose.

We provide barrier-free access by offering Dance 4 Us Mt Roskill free of charge, and using accessible venues. Our therapists live in the local communities where they serve, building strong, ongoing relationships with the kiritaki, whānau, and carers in the community to ensure full participation and access to the resources we provide. This approach fosters trust, continuity, and engagement, making it easier for rangatahi whaikaha and their families to participate and benefit from our services.

This initiative prioritizes those in greatest need by offering an accessible and inclusive space where rangatahi can develop self-esteem, social skills, and physical health, while also supporting their carers. We are dedicated to empowering individuals with disabilities by nurturing their creativity, fostering meaningful connections, and providing avenues for self-expression, making their lives richer and more fulfilling. This experience is not just about physical activity - it's about emotional and psychological growth, helping to bridge the gap in services and create lasting, meaningful impacts in the lives of rangatahi whaikaha and their families.

Identified community outcomes:

The particular benefit to the Hillsborough community lies in the local, 24/7 availability of an AED device. Currently AED devices in the immediate Hillsborough area are located in premises with access restrictions (such as during business hours). It is accepted that use of a defibrillator within 3-5 minutes of a cardiac arrest can increase survival rates by up to 40%. The cabinet containing the device can be unlocked through using a code available from the 111 call centre. The location of the device can be registered in a specialised app (AED Locations App) or online (<https://aedlocations.co.nz/>) to assist in finding the device in an emergency. The Church facilities are used by a range of groups through the week and some evenings. People participating in these group activities range from the elderly down to infants. A cardiac event can happen at any age. The model of AED envisaged for this project is designed for a general public situations where the level of first aid training of users may not be known and the device can be quickly switched between settings for adults and children.

- People have access to opportunities that improve their wellbeing.

It is understood that while over 9000 AED devices have been installed across the country, only 5% are accessible 24/7 because the vast majority are located within premises that are locked after business hours. According to the website (<https://aedlocations.co.nz/>) this is true of existing AED

devices in the Hillsborough area. Is intended that this project provides an AED resource within the local Hillsborough community that is accessible 24/7. It is well-established that use of a defibrillator within 3-5 minutes of a cardiac arrest can increase survival rates by up to 40%. This project is intended to provide that support to people attending the Church and to the wider Hillsborough community, hence increasing their community sense of well-being and improving the chance of a favourable outcome following an adverse cardiac event. The AED device that has been identified is designed for general public spaces where the level of first aid training of users may not be known. It includes an Adult/Child Quick Switch so the same set of electrode pads can be used for both adults and children.

- Minimizing material & resource expenses by shifting to more digital resources and limiting printed handouts.
- Adjusting refreshment costs by offering simpler options or seeking in-kind support from local businesses.

Our goal is to ensure the core six-week program runs effectively, even with limited funding.

The minimum amount required for our project to proceed is \$5,470.

This covers essential costs:

- Project Coordinator (12 hours per week for 10 weeks) – \$3,120
- Facilitator (6 sessions + preparation) – \$1,440
- Operational Costs – \$750

With this funding, we can deliver the six core sessions, ensuring small business owners in Puketāpapa receive essential skills and support. If additional funding is secured, we can enhance marketing, materials, and participant experience.
