Key achievements include constitution review clinics and organisational assessments, with workshops on collaboration and funding strategies planned for Q4. A & K Thomson delivered financial resilience workshops and mentoring to over 100 participants from eight community groups in Franklin. This initiative helped secure more than \$120,000 in grants, created five full-time roles, acquired 21 laptops for mobile delivery, and introduced a shared services model that reduces risk for smaller organisations.

Local Environment al		Predator Free Franklin Te Arahikoi	This is a continuation of the existing Predator Free Franklin project which enables coordinated community-led pest control efforts across Franklin. The primary focus is to support landowners to carry out pest animal and plant control and the development and growth of new community groups. They service direct requests from local conservation groups, businesses, and residents, and facilitate and leverage partnerships within the Franklin community to achieve landscape scale pest plant and animal control and enhance biodiversity outcomes. Additional funding is required to meet growing demand. In 2023/2024, Predator Free Franklin assisted 12 new community groups with growing interest from landowners. Over 25 pest and conservation education events were delivered across Franklin, provisioning hundreds of locals with pest control tools, expertise, and ongoing support. In the 2024/2025 period, this project's reach will continue to expand with additional emphasis on pest plant control. Three community events were held in both February and March. Community interest remains strong, with the addition of herbicides and pest plant education to the predator control program proving successful. This time of year typically sees many ferret catches, and this year is no exception. Despite community efforts, these predators remain an issue.

A Karaka / Te Hihi hub day is planned for the coming weeks. In March, the annual CREST BBQ featured talks from local conservation volunteers. During the event, 70 kilograms of bait and over 60 traps were distributed to landowners to combat pest animals. Local biodiversity monitoring confirmed a resident bat population in the Spookers / Kingseat area, which will benefit significantly from local pest control efforts.
Local Environment al			This collaboration project led by EcoQuest with Ngaati Te Ara Waiohua and Predator Free Franklin continues to develop our understanding of long-tailed bat populations across Franklin, to better understand habitat utilisation and identify priority management sites to make informed decisions in protection of this critically endangered taonga species. The 2024/2025 project would continue radio-tracking, in collaboration with trained kaitiaki, community volunteers, and landowners, to better understand population sizes, and how these bats utilise the fragmented rural landscape. Additional iwi and volunteers will be trained to carry out radio-telemetry, and train more certified bat handlers. The mark-recapture survey will see the banding of all bats caught to determine population size with several bats having transmitters attached to gain further insights into behaviours in the landscape. The output of this research will assist with the development of coordinated and effective conservation management, increase Waiuku landowner and Māori engagement in conservation, and upskill and empower people to protect pekapeka. This project relies significantly on partners Ngaati Te Ata Waiohua and Predator Free Franklin, with their landowner contacts. A significant number of bats were caught, including a newly discovered colony near Patumāhoe. A couple of community members were certified as bat handlers. In February, local board members were hosted for a bat-catching night, strengthening their engagement with the work. Throughout this period, multiple bat walks and talks were conducted, increasing public awareness of bat conservation. At the eastern end of Sunkist Bay approximately 200 metres of tipped rock, rock revetment, was constructed in 1972 to protect the coastal edge of the reclaimed reserve. The low lying area has been developed to contain a carpark, ramp and reserve area. Figure 4.1 identifies the existing coastal structures present at Sunkist Bay. Sunkist Bay is exposed to major storm-generated northerly and north easterly storm surges, and wind generated waves from the north-west to the east that form in the Tamaki Strait. Wave overtopping in the January 2018 storms resulted in scour and erosion of the unprotected ground above the low crest of the existing tipped rock structure. The storm damage triggered the need for the coastal protection to be renewed. Tonkin + Taylor Limited were engaged to assess coastal erosion damage to the structure and adjacent reserve, and to provide detailed design information to effect replacement of the tipped rock protection. A report was prepared and the relative benefits and disadvantages of rock armour revetment, and a grouted rock seawall alternative were discussed. At a workshop in September 2018 the board discussed with staff and representatives from Tonkin + Taylor Limited the two options, and the staff recommendation for the existing tipped rock to be replaced with a new rock armour revetment. There are several existing coastal structures located in Sunkist Bay, as identified on Figure 4 1. Maintenance of the existing plants on five farms is ongoing with both volunteer and contractor work. Preparation is ongoing for planting within the quarter four period. This will involve working with further landowners and students from Trees for Survival to plant farmlands and educate students on farming practices.
